The appearance of the new cultural elements of the Balkans and the Thrace in the Early Iron Age have been explained by changes in environmental conditions, migrations, western influences, development of local cultures, etc. The cultural relations between the Balkans, Anatolian and the Aegean region at this period are also challenging, These approaches will be discussed in the

Description	The PPN settlements represented the largest complex

sedentary communities in SE Anatolia and SW Asia between ca. 10.200 - 6500 BC. The reasons for the decline of the PPNB are still a phenomenon and have been debated at some length since 20-25 years. Several models have been offered, like changes in climate, breakdown in environmental conditions due to intensive exploitation, social pressure, introduction of sheep and goat, new concepts, new economic strategies, etc. The other current discussion is on the 'exact' time period of the beginning of Pottery Neolithic way of life. Since the basic principles of the ceramic technology was already known in the PPNA, whether the usage of baked clay vessels is a choice-based behavior of different communities or not still remains unclear. Not only the unclearness of the PPN-PN transition period in many sites but also the weakness of records for the beginning and the widespread adoption of ceramic technology have been kept the unsolved problem up-todate. This course is mainly focused on the problems of adaptation and developing strategies in the Pottery Neolithic Period at Anatolia and Southwest Asia.
