Course Description:

This course is designed for students at the intermediate level in grammar, reading, listening and writing. Students are expected to have an insight about how a text is organized in order read, write, listen critically and understand better. This course engages learners in thinking about grammar rules and offers them a range of communicative activities. It also offers learners opportunities to develop fluency in using the grammar features. It enables students' understanding of written texts, as well as acquisition of vocabulary. Another important aspect of the course is writing. Students will acquire basic writing skills through reading activities in the coursebook. This course also covers three kinds of speaking activities that are Language-focused, fluency development and meaning-focused. It also systematically teaches aspects of pronunciation and intonation that contribute to effective communication.

Objectives

At the end of this course students will be able to:

- understand the vocabulary needed to comprehend the text itself.
- identify a different angle on the topic in a different genre.
- recognize new words and explain them by using the target language.
- use new vocabulary in a different context.
- evaluate and complete analytical tasks as preparation for the writing task.
- have opportunity to use all the language skills they have learnt.
- bring their own knowledge, experiences and opinions to the topics covered.
- identify the most common errors learners make.
- create a presentation and discuss about a topic in the classroom.
- practice in planning, organizing, writing and checking.
- practice grammar and vocabulary in guided writing, speaking, listening and reading tasks.
